 <u>Communication and Language:</u> Shows interests in play with sound, songs and rhymes linked to wild animals (S). Understands who, what, where in simple questions (U). Listen with interest to the noises adults make when they read stories (LA). Shows interest in play with rhymes (LA). 	 Expressive Arts and Design: Use a variety of media to create wild animals for our topic display (CM). Creates sound effects and movements linked to topic (BIE). Mathematics: Uses some numbers and number language within play (C). Creates arches and enclosures when building animal habitats (S). Sorting different animals (wild and farm) (P). Understanding the World: Talk about the things they have observed such as animals and their natural world. Research where jungles and savannahs are located (TW). 		 <u>Personal Social and Emotional</u> <u>Development:</u> Share and respect our toys and resources in Nursery (UE). May recognise that some actions can hurt or upset others (UE). Enjoys playing alone, alongside others and playing with their friends (MR).
 <u>Physical Development:</u> Develops independence in self-care and shows an awareness of routines (HSC). Begin to recognise danger and seeks the support from a familiar adult (HSC). Dances and sings to music rhymes and sings linked to our topic (M&H). 			 Literacy Is interested in books and rhymes and may have favourite (R). Share a varied range of fiction and non-fiction linked to 'Go Wild' topic. Gives some meaning to drawings and paintings.

Democracy:
